

SATURDAY, December 13, 1822.

The senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday, except Mr. M'Kim.

The bill to appoint commissioners for the purpose of dividing Dorchester county into six separate election districts, was read a second time and laid on the table.

The bill to confirm an act to alter that part of the constitution and form of government relating to the division of Dorchester county into five separate election districts, and the bill, entitled, An act for the support of Thomas Deford of Queen-Anne's county, an afflicted son of Edward Deford of said county, were read a third time, passed and sent to the house of delegates.

Mr. Chambers from the committee to whom was referred the bill to provide for the election of a vestry of St. John's Church, in Queen Caroline Parish, in Anne-Arundel county, reported, that the committee had had the same under consideration, and were of opinion that the said bill ought to pass.

The question was then put, shall the bill pass? Determined in the affirmative, and it was sent to the house delegates.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a resolution appointing a day for humiliation and prayer: a bill, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act relating to public roads in the several counties therein mentioned; a bill, entitled, An act to provide for the building a bridge over Antieatum creek in Washington county; a bill, entitled, An act to provide for the building of a bridge over Antieatum creek at John Shaefer's mill, in Washington county; a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Alexander Robertson of Worcester county; and a bill entitled, An act to confirm an act, entitled, An act to alter and change such parts of the constitution and form of government as relates to the division of Anne-Arundel county into election districts, and to change the place of holding elections in the second election district of said county; which were severally read the first time and laid on the table.

The resolution approving the measures of the general government, was read a second time and laid on the table.

Mr. Miller moved to amend the fifteenth rule, so as to make it read. "The name of every member shall appear on the journal, on motion for leave to bring in a bill, on motion proposing a resolution, and when the yeas and nays shall be called on a motion to amend a bill, resolution or order;" and the question was put, and determined in the negative.

The bill to ascertain and establish a divisional line between Anne-Arundel and Calvert counties, was read a second time, amended, and ordered to be engrossed for a third reading.

Mr. Johnson presented the memorial of Elias Ellicott, George Ellicott and Thomas Ellicott, of this city of Baltimore, praying for an act of incorporation of a company in Baltimore county for the manufacturing of cotton, woollen, and other goods. Also the memorial of Jonathan Ellicott, Elias Ellicott, and others, of the city of Baltimore, praying for an act of incorporation of a company in Baltimore county for the manufacturing of iron; which were severally read and referred to Messrs. Johnson, Chambers and Brownley, to consider and report thereon.

The senate adjourns until Monday morning at 10 o'clock.

MONDAY, December 16th, 1822.

The Senate met. Present the same members as on Saturday, except Mr. Wootton. The proceedings of Saturday were read.

The resolution appointing a day for humiliation and prayer; the resolution relative to the Cumberland road; the supplement to the act entitled, An act for the benefit of the trustees of Garrison Forrest Academy, and the Franklin Academy, in Baltimore county, were read a second time and laid on the table.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the following message; which was read:

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, December 16, 1822.

Gentlemen of the Senate—Having understood that Samuel Stevens, Jr. (the Governor elect,) has arrived at the seat of government, we have appointed Messrs. Millard and Norris, to join such gentlemen as may be named by your honorable body, to wait upon him, to ascertain when it will be convenient for him to qualify.

Also a bill entitled, An additional supplement to an act entitled, An act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road from the turnpike near Westminster to Taney-town, thence with the main street through Emmittsburg to Troup's tavern; which was read the first, and by special order a second time, and laid on the table. Also, a bill entitled, A supplement to an act entitled, An act to repeal all such parts of the constitution and form of government as relate to the division of Baltimore county into seven separate election districts, and for other purposes; which was read the first time and laid on the table.

Mr. Chambers submitted the following message:
