

On motion, the question was put, will the senate reconsider the bill for the relief of Charity F. Barriere of the city of Baltimore? Determined in the affirmative.

The bill was then read, passed, and returned to the house of delegates.

The resolution in favour of St. Peter's Free School, was read a second and third time by special order, and the question was put, will the senate assent to the resolution.

The yeas and nays being required, appeared as follow:

AFFIRMATIVE—Messrs. Stuart, Prest. Claude, Johnson, Miller, Quinton, Wootton—6.

NEGATIVE—Messrs. Cockey, Kent, Orrell—3.

Determined in the affirmative, and it was sent to the house of delegates.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of John S. Blake, sheriff of Queen-Anne's county; which was read the first time and laid on the table.

And returns the bill for the relief of George Gingell, of Montgomery county, endorsed "will pass," and it was ordered to be engrossed.

On motion, the question was put, will the senate reconsider the bill appointing commissioners to extend Washington-street in Rockville, and for other purposes? Determined in the affirmative.

The resolution relative to the distribution of the laws and votes and proceedings, was read a third time, amended, passed, and returned to the house of delegates.

Amendments proposed. 1st Strike out the whole of the "preamble." 2nd. At the end of the resolution strike out the word "lowest" and insert "best."

The bill relative to trespasses quare clausum fregit, was read a second time and laid on the table.

The senate adjourned until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.

FRIDAY, February 21, 1823.

The senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill for the relief of Nathaniel Boggs, was read the second and third time by special order, passed, and returned to the house of delegates.

The resolution for surveying the routes from Baltimore to the Potomac river for a canal, was read a third time, and the question was put, Will the senate assent to the resolution?

The yeas and nays being required appeared as follows:

AFFIRMATIVE—Messrs. Stuart, Prest. Claude, Cockey, Dickinson, Johnson, Kent, Miller, Quinton—8.

NEGATIVE—Messrs. Orrell, Wootton—2? Determined in the affirmative, and it was sent to the house of delegates.

The resolution relative to a route for a canal from Baltimore to Susquehanna, was read a third time.

On motion of Mr. Miller, the question was put, Will the senate amend the resolution by inserting after the word "practicable" in the the 7th line the following: "and shall also be directed to lay out and survey a route for a canal from the same point on the Susquehannah, on Conowago Falls, to the head of tide-water on the Susquehannah?" Determined in the affirmative.

The question was then put, Will the senate assent to the resolution as amended? The yeas and nays being required appeared as follow:

AFFIRMATIVE—Messrs. Stuart, Prest. Claude, Dickinson, Johnson, Miller—5.

NEGATIVE—Messrs. Cockey, Kent, Orrell, Quinton—4? Determined in the affirmative; and it was sent to the house of delegates.

The further supplement to the act, entitled, A supplement to an act to incorporate a company for the purpose of cutting and making a canal between the river Delaware and Chesapeake Bay, was read a second and by special order a third time, passed unanimously, and returned to the house of delegates.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a resolution in favor of Thomas Harwood, of Benjamin; which was read the first and by special order a second and third time, assented to, and returned to the house of delegates; a resolution in favor of John Quynn and Andrew Slicer; which was read the first, and by special order a second and third time, assented to, and returned to the house of delegates; a resolution relative to the Library Committee; which was read the first, and by special order a second and third time, assented to, and returned to the house of delegates; a resolution in favor of John Carter, which was read the first, and by special order a second and third time, assented to, and returned to the house of delegates; a resolution in favor of William Gist, and others, which was read the first and by special order a second and third time, assented to, and returned to the house of delegates; a resolution in favor of Thomas Linnan, which was read and referred to the committee on revolutionary pensions; a bill in favor of William Wright of Queen-Anne's county, and a bill, entitled, An act relating to the inspection of salted fish in the city of Baltimore; which were read the first time and laid on the table; a resolution relative to the chancery office; which was read the first time and laid on the table; the additional supplement to an act relating to the administration of justice in this state, passed at December session 1801, chapter 74, was read a second time, amended, and laid on the table.
