Mr. Miller from the committee to whom was referred the further supplement to an act empowering the levy court of Cecil county at their discretion to levy a sum of money to build a bridge over Octorara creek in said county, at or near Samuel Rowland's store, reported, that the committee had had the same under consideration, and were of opinion that it ought to pass, with the following amendment, viz. In the 2d section at the end thereof, strike out the words tabove named" and insert the word "dollars." The bill was then read a second, and by special order a third time, amended as proposed, passed, and returned to the house of delegates.

On motion by Mr. Claude, Leave was given to bring in a bill to be entitled, An act to alter and amend the forty-first section of the constitution of this state, so far as it relates to Ealismore county; and it was ordered, That Messrs. Claude, Scott and Orrell, should be a commit-

tee to prepare and report the same.

Mr. Bowie presented the petition of Simon Frazer, of Prince-George's county, praying for an act of maturalization; which was read and referred to Messrs. Bowie, Dickinson and Quinton.

Mr. Miller presented the annual report of the trustees of West Nottingham Academy; which was read and laid on the table.

Mr. Bowie submitted the following resolution; which was read and assented to.

Resolved, That the governor and council be requested to inform the senate, as soon as their convenience will permit, whether they have obtained the information required by resolution 47, passed at the last session, concerning the purchase of a lot of ground in the city of Baltimore, and the erection thereon of a fire proof tobacco inspection warehouse.
