o'clock to day. No person is put in nomination for this office, in addition to the gentlemen named by you. Messrs. Quinton and Bowie, are appointed by the senate to join the gentlemen selected by you to count the ballots and report thereon.

On motion by Mr. Chambers, leave was given to bring in a bill to be entitled "a supplement to the act entitled 'an act declaring the power of the governor in certain criminal cases.' Ordered, that Messrs. Chambers, Kent and Orrell, should be a committee to prepare and report the same.

Mr. Chambers from the committee reported the said bill

and it was read the first time and laid on the table.

The senate proceeded to the election of a governor. The hallot-box being prepared, the ballots were deposited therein, sealed up and delivered to the committee of the senate appointed to meet the committee of the house of delegates, who retired to the conference room, and after some time, returned and reported that Joseph Kent, had fifty-nine votes, William Tyler had thirty votes, and Thomas H. Carroll had one vote.

Whereupon, it was declared in the senate, that Joseph Kent having had the greater number of votes, was duly elected gov-

ernor of Maryland.

Mr. Chambers from the committee reported a bill entitled an additional supplement to the act entitled "an act directing the manner of serving out attachments in this province and limiting the extent of them, and it was read the first time and laid on the table.

Mr. Chambers offered the following message, which was

read, assented to, and sent to the house of delegates.
