

The bill for the relief of the executors in Maryland, of William Murdoch, of London, deceased, was read the second time, and referred to Messrs. Tilghman, Brownley and Dickinson.

Mr. Johnson asked and obtained leave to bring in a bill to be entitled, An act authorising the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore to appoint Wood Corders for said city. Ordered, That Messrs Johnson, Tilghman and Quinton be a committee to prepare and report the same.

The President laid before the senate a communication from George Handy and Littleton I. Dennis, on the part of the trustees of Washington Academy, in Somerset county, shewing the state of said institutions, which was read and referred to the house of delegates.

Also a memorial from sundry inhabitants of Somerset county, praying that the act passed at last session, entitled, An act to alter and repeal such parts of the constitution and form of government as relate to the division of Semerset county into election districts, might not be confirmed, which was read and referred to the house of delegates.

The resolution in favor of literary institutions, was read a second and a third time by special order, assented to and returned to the house of delegates

Mr. Tilghman reported favorably upon the bill for the relief of the executors in Maryland, of William Murdock, of London, deceased. The bill was then read a third time by special order, passed and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Johnson from the committee, reported a bill entitled "an act authorising the mayor and city council of Baltimore, to appoint wood-corders for said city," which was read the first, and by special order, a second and third time, passed and sent to the house of delegates.

Mr. Johnson reported favorably upon the bill incorporating the Maryland Institute for the promotion of the mechanic arts

The said bill was then read a second and third time, passed and returned to the house of delegates.

The message proposed by Mr. Claude on yesterday, in answer to that from the house of delegates, proposing a joint letter to be addressed to Mr. John N. Steele, of Dorchester county, by the president of the senate and speaker of the house of delegates, informing him of his election as a member of the council, was read a second time, and after some discussion, it was ordered to lie on the table.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a bill entitled "an act to encourage the destruction of crows in the several counties therein mentioned. which was read the first time and laid on the table.

The senate adjourned until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.
