

On motion, the question was put, will the senate amend the bill by inserting the words "or decree" after the word "judgment," in the seventh line of the second section? Determined in the affirmative.

On motion, the question was put, will the senate amend the bill by inserting the words "or register," after the word "clerk," in the last line of the third section. Determined in the affirmative.

On motion, the question was put, will the senate amend the bill by inserting the words "said court, or one of the judges thereof or by the," after the words "by the," in the third line of the fourth section? Determined in the affirmative.

On motion, the question was put, will the senate amend the bill by adding to the end of the fourth section the words "or by the register of the courts of chancey;" determined in the affirmative; and, on motion, the bill was ordered to be laid on the table.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a bill entitled, a supplement to an act entitled an act relating to the appointment of constable in this state, and for other purposes, passed, December session, eighteen hundred and twenty-four, chapter one hundred and forty, which was read the first time and laid on the table.

Also a bill entitled, an act to authorize the mayor and city council of Baltimore, to establish public schools in the city of Baltimore, which was read the first time, and referred to Messrs. Scott, Brownley and Johnson.

Also, a bill entitled, a supplement to an act entitled, an act to extend the jurisdiction of justices of the peace of this state, which was read the first and second time and referred to Messrs. Bowie, Dickerson and Johnson.

And returned the bill entitled, an act to widen Water-street in the city of Baltimore between South and South Calvert-streets, endorsed, "will pass."

Also the bill entitled, an act authorizing the mayor and city council of Baltimore to appoint wood corders for said city, endorsed, "will not pass."

Mr. Johnson from the committee reported a bill entitled, an act to authorize Solomon Etting, of the city of Baltimore, to improve a lot on Pine-street, in said city, which was read the first time and laid on the table.

The president laid before the senate the following letter, which was read and sent to the house of delegates.

The Speaker of the House of Delegates,*

GENTLEMEN:

I have been prevented by severe and protracted indisposition
