Monday, January 23, 1826.

The Senate met. Present the same members as on Saturday. The proceedings of Saturday were read.

The president laid before the senate the memorial of Ann Baker and William Baker, administrators of William Baker, John Wroth, administrator of Kirvin Wroth, and Rebecca Brice and Martha Brice, executrix of Richard Brice, praying that the right of the state to a certain judgment against Robert Wright, might be assigned and transferred to the memorialists, in order that the same, with interests and costs, may be paid by them. Which was read and referred to the consideration of the house of delegates.

The resolution relative to the clerk of Caroline county court, was read a third time, assented to, and returned to the house of delegates.

The bill to confirm the proceedings of William C. Dawkins, late a justice of the peace for Calvert county, was read a second time and laid on the table.

The bill regulating writs of error, and granting appeals to the court of appeals, was read a third time, passed and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Scott from the committee, made a favorable report upon the bill for the relief of Barbara Wagers, William Lowe, John Clary and Richard Howard, of Frederick county; the bill was then read a second time and laid on the table.
