Saturday, January 28, 1826.

The senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday, except Mr. Scott. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

Mr. Johnson from the committee to whom was referred the bill entitled, an act to limit the application and effect of morting gages, reported that the committee had had the same under consideration, and were of opinion that it ought to pass, with the follow

lowing amendment, viz.

Strike out the words "passage of this act," in the third line of the bill and insert, "first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and twenty six." Which amendment was read and assented to. The bill was then read a second, and by special oreder, a third time, passed and returned to the house of delegates.

The resolution relative to the correction of a patent, was read a third time, assented to, and returned to the house of delegates.

The bill for the relief of James Mobly and wife, of Prince George's county, was read a second time and laid on the table.

On motion, the bill entitled, an act to establish a court within the city of Baltimore to be called the Baltimore district court was made the order of the day for Thursday next the second

February.

Mr. Johnson from the committee made an unfavorable report upon the bill to authorize Elizabeth Abrams, of Cecil county, to record a deed. The bill was then read a second and third time by special order, rejected and returned to the house of delegates.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a resolution relative to the death of the late treasurer of the western shore; which was read the first and by special order a second and third time, unanimously assented to, and returned to the house of dele-

gates.

Also, a resolution in favor of John K. B. Emory; which was

read the first time and laid on the table.

Also, a bill entitled, an act to ascertain and settle the salary of the members of the council for the present year; which was read the first and by special order a second and third time, passed, and returned to the house of delegates.

Also, a bill entitled, an act to provide for the more comfortable maintenance of sick persons confined in the several goals of this state; which was read the first time and referred to Messrs.

Tilghman, Claude and Brownley.

The resolution in favor of John K. B. Emory; was read a second and third time by special order, assented to, and returned to the house of delegates.
