

second and by special order a third time, assented to, and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Claude from the committee on divorces, to whom was referred the bill to divorce Eve Feezer and her husband Joseph Feezer, of Frederick county, reported that the committee had had the same under consideration, and were of opinion that it ought to pass with the following amendments: At the end of the bill add the following:—"Nor shall Eve Feezer be authorized to have or claim any right or interest in the estate, real, personal or mixed, of the said Joseph Feezer, to be by him acquired after the passage of this act.

*And be it enacted,* That the said Eve Feezer shall have and exercise all the rights, privileges and immunities, and be subject to all the legal responsibilities of a femme sole, in the same manner she would have been if she had never been married.

*And be it enacted,* That the aforesaid Eve Feezer be, and she is hereby declared to be entitled to the custody and guardianship of her children by her present marriage during their minority.

*And be it enacted,* That the said Joseph Feezer shall not be liable for any debts to be hereafter contracted by the said Eve Feezer; which amendment was read and assented to. The bill was then read a second and by special order a third time, passed, and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Claude from the same committee made a favorable report upon the bill for the relief of Charlotte Schwartze, of Frederick county. The said bill was then read a second, and by special order a third time, amended, passed with the proposed amendment, and returned to the house of delegates. Amendment proposed; add to the end of the first section the words, "which he may hereafter acquire."

Mr. Miller from the committee reported a bill entitled, an act to repeal in part an act entitled, an act directing the time, places and manner of holding elections for representatives of this state in the congress of the United States, and for appointing electors on the part of this state for choosing a president and vice-president of the United States, and for the regulation of the said elections, and also to report the act of assembly therein mentioned; passed December 14th, 1790, chapter 16; which was read the first time and laid on the table.

Mr. Orrell from the committee to whom was referred the bill to appoint commissioners for the purpose of altering the divisional line between the first and second election districts in Caroline county, reported that the committee had had the same under consideration, and were of opinion that it ought to pass with the following amendments, viz:
