

ers for the purpose of altering," and in lieu thereof insert the words, "alter and change."

2nd. In the 2nd, line of the preamble after the word "second," insert the word "election."

3rd. After the first line of the first section, strike out the residue of the bill, and insert as follows, "that in lieu of the division lines heretofore established by law as the divisional lines between the first and second election districts in Caroline county, on the east side of the Choptank river, the following shall be and are hereby established the divisional lines between the said districts, viz: Beginning on the east side of Choptank river at the mouth of Frampton's mill branch, thence running up said branch and binding therewith until it comes to a notable place on said branch, commonly called and known by the name of the Rackoon Trap, thence by a straight line to a Methodist meeting house, commonly called Lee's meeting house, which stands on or near the main road leading from Denton to Whiteleysburgh, then with said road to the state line, which divides between the states of Maryland and Delaware;" which amendments were read and assented to. The bill was then read a second time and laid on the table.

Mr. Claude from the committee on divorces, made a favorable report upon the bill for the relief of Nancy Vissage, of Harford county. The bill was then read a second and by special order a third time, passed, and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Claude from the same committee made a favorable report upon the bill for the relief of Ann Margaret Beatty, of Washington county. The bill was then read a second and by special order a third time, passed, and returned to the house of delegates.

The resolution in favor of the heirs of Peter Joy, was read a third time, by special order, assented to, and returned to the house of delegates.

The senate adjourned until Monday morning 10 o'clock.
