

Mr. Quinton from the committee, made a favorable report upon the bill to authorise John M'Knight to cut a canal therein mentioned, in Dorchester county. The bill was then read a third time, passed, and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Brownley from the committee, made a favorable report upon the bill to extend the benefit of an act passed 11th February, 1822, chapter 152, relating to public roads in the several counties therein mentioned, to Nathaniel Hoskin, of Harford county. The bill was then read a second, and by special order, a third time, passed, and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Johnson from the committee, made a favorable report upon the resolution in favor of Mount Joy Bailey. The resolution was then read a second, and by special order, a third time, assented to, and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Miller from the committee to whom was referred the additional supplement to the act, entitled an act to incorporate a company to make the several turnpike roads therein mentioned, passed at December session 1815, chapter 190, reported, that the committee had had the same under consideration, and were of opinion that it ought to pass with sundry amendments, which were assented to. The bill was then read a second time and laid on the table.

The engrossed bill, entitled an additional supplement to the act directing the manner of serving out attachments in this province, and limiting the extent of them, was read a third time by special order, passed, and sent to the house of delegates.

The clerk of the council delivered the following communication, which was read, and with the accompanying documents, referred to the house of delegates.

In Council, Annapolis, February 3d, 1826.

Gentlemen of the Senate, and

of the House of Delegates.

In compliance with the request of his excellency the governor of Kentucky, we lay before you a resolution of the general assembly of that state, disapproving of the amendment to the constitution of the United States, proposed by the legislature of Georgia, relative to the ingress of persons of color into any of the United States, contrary to the laws of such state.

We also enclose you a letter just received from major Peter, one of our representatives in congress, acknowledging the receipt of the resolutions of the general assembly, relative to amending the constitution of the United States, in relation to the election of president and vice-president of the United States.
