

A supplement to an act, for the benefit of Ann Rochester, and Francis Rochester, was read a third time by special order, passed and returned to the house of delegates.

The senate adjourned until Monday morning 10 o'clock.

Monday, February 20th, 1826.

The senate met. Present the same members as on Saturday. The proceedings of Saturday were read.

To the Honorable the President

Of the Senate, and the Honorable

The Speaker of the House of Delegates of Maryland.

Gentlemen—I had the honor on my arrival at this place, to receive your joint letter of the 24th ultimo, communicating the intelligence of my election to the senate of the United States. Allow me, gentlemen, to express the great gratification I feel at this indication of the confidence of my fellow citizens of the legislature of Maryland, with most of whom I have had the pleasure to be associated for some years past in the common duty of promoting the interests of our state. Encouraged by this indication, and anticipating the same indulgent consideration for the future, I accept with diffidence the high trust confided to me.

With the highest consideration and respect for the honorable bodies, over which you respectively preside, and the greatest regard for yourselves personally,
