and first Monday in October, in each and every year thereafter an accurate account of the distribution of the fund committed to their charge, and also the number of pupils educated out of the said fund, disignating the sex and age of said puplis.

Which amendments were read and asented to. The bill was then read a second and by special order a third time, and

passed with the proposed amendments.

Mr. Tilghman, from the committee to whom was referred the bill respecting the town of Clear Spring, in Washington county, reported that the committee had had the same under consideration, and were of opinion that it ought not to pass. The bill was then read a second time and laid on the table.

Mr. Kent, from the committee, reported a bill entitled an act for regulating and inspecting weights and measures made in this

state, which was read the first time and laid on the table.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a bill entitled an act to repeal a supplement to an act, entitled an act to prevent the unlawful exportation of negroes and mulattoes; and to alter and amend the laws concerning runaways, and to direct the sheriffs respecting their apprehension and commitment, which was read the first time, and referred to Messrs. Bowie, Kent and Quinton.

The engrossed bill, relating to the Baltimore county court, was read the third time by special order, and the question put, shall the bill pass? The year and nays being required appeared
