

On motion, the bill to provide for the public instruction of youth, in the primary schools throughout this state, was made the order for monday next, the 27th instant.

Mr. Johnson, from the committee to whom was referred, the bill to incorporate the Ætnæ company of Baltimore, reported that the committee had had the same under consideration, and were of opinion that it ought to pass. The bill was then read the second, and by special order the third time, passed, and returned to the house of Delegates.

On motion, the question was put, will the senate reconsider the amendments heretofore proposed to the additional supplement to the act, entitled, an act to incorporate the trustees of the Franklin Academy, or school in Baltimore county? Determined in the affirmative.

The question was then put, will the senate recede from the said amendments?

Mr. Johnson offered the following message, which was read, assented to and sent to the house of delegates:

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

The senate, in compliance with the request of your message of the 21st instant, have reconsidered their amendments to the bill, entitled, an additional supplement to an act, entitled, an act to incorporate the trustees of the Franklin academy or school in Baltimore county," and have receded from the same

The question was then put, shall the bill pass? Determined in the affirmative; and the bill was returned to the house of delegates.

The bill respecting the town of Clear Spring, in Washington county, was read the third time, rejected and returned to the house of delegates.

Thomas Emory, Esquire a senator elect, appeared, in the senate chamber, qualified and took his seat.

The senate adjourned until Monday morning 10 o'clock

The senate met. Present, the same members as on Saturday. The proceedings of Saturday were read.

Mr. Emory was appointed as a member of the committee of ways and means, in the place of Mr. Chambers, elected a member to represent this state in the senate of the United States.

Mr. Johnson presented the petition of Alexander Hemp-hill, of the city of Philadelphia, praying for a special act of insolvency, which was read and referred to Messrs. Johnson, Brownley, Claude, Orrell and Quinton.
