Tuesday, February 28th, 1826.

The resolution relative to Robert Stewart, collector of Somerset county, was read a third time, assented to and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Emory presented the resolution of sundry persons, citizens of Kent county, praying a law to authorise the purchase of a farm for the use of the poor of the county, and for the sale of the present alms house, which was read and referred to Messrs. Emory, Tilghman and Orrell.
