Which was read, and with the accompanying documents, referred to the consideration of the house of delegates.

The bill to make valid a deed of manumission executed by William Moffet, late of Kent county deceased; was read a third time by special order passed, and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Bowie, from the committee reported a bill entitled an act, to reduce the charges on cooperage inspection, outage, portage, and sealing, in the state ware houses for the inspection of tobacco in the city of Baltimore.

Mr. Brownley, from the committee made a favorable report upon the bill regulating ferries in Harford county; the bill was then read a second and by special order a third time, passed and returned to the house of delegates.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered the following messages which were read.

By the House of Delegates,

March 2d, 1826.

Gentlemen of the senate,

We return you the "bill entitled an act, supplementary to an act to regulate lotteries," in the hope that you will consent to reconsider it. It is important to the revenue of the state, that the commissioners of lotteries should have authority to draw as many schemes of lotteries as they may deem expedient, instead of being restricted to two, as they are at present; and it is hoped that on reconsideration, the bill will be passed by your honorable body.
