Insert as an additional section, between the 5th and 6th sections,

And be it enacted, That after the sum of \$70,000 including the sum of \$31,404 22 already raised shall have been raised by virtue of this act, and its several supplements to which this is a further supplement, the privilege conferred by the said act and its several supplements, is hereby repealed.
