The resolution in favor of Thomas Harwood, was read a second, and by special order, a third time, assented to, and returned to the house of delegates.

On motion, the senate reconsidered the bill to ascertain and settle the law, relative to writs of forcible entry and detainer. The same being read, was rejected and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Miller from the committee made a favorable report upon the bill relative to the school fund for Montgomery county, and to the education of poor children in said county. The bill was then read a second, and by special order, a third time, passed and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Bowie offered the following message which was read, assented to and sent to the house of delegates.

Mr. Emory asked and obtained leave to bring in a bill to be entitled an additional supplement to an act for the benefit of Ann Rochester and Francis Rochester. Ordered, that Messrs. Emory, Tilghman and Kent, be a committee to prepare and report the same.

Mr. Tilghman from the committee, made a favorable report upon the bill authorising and requiring the erection of indexes or finger boards in the several counties therein mentioned. The bill was then read a second, and by special order, a third time, passed and returned to the house of delegates.
