Mr. Dickinson from the committee made a favorable report upon the bill relating to the public roads in Talbot county, the bill was then read a second and by special order, a third time passed, and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Orrell from the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims, made an unfavorable report upon the resolution in favor of Susannah Larham the resolution, was read a second and by special order, a third time, rejected, and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Orrell from the same committee made a favorable report upon the resolution in favor of Daniel Spalding; the resolution was then read a second and by special order, a third time, assented to and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Orrell from the same committee, made a favorable report upon the resolution in favor of William Deavor, and the resolution in favor of Samuel White. The said resolutions were then severally read a second and by special order a third time, assented to, and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Brownley from the committee to whom was referred the supplement to the act incorporating into one, the several acts relating to constables fees, passed December session, eighteen hundred and twenty-one, chapter one hundred and sixty two, reported that the committee had had the same under consideration and were of opinion that it ought to pass with the following amendment, viz:

First section. Strike out from the 16th to 24th lines inclusive.

Which amendment was read and assented to.

The bill was then read a second, and by special order, a third time, passed and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Claude from the committee to whom was referred the bill to abolish all such parts of the constitution and form of government, as relate to the time and manner of electing the senate, and the mode of filling up vacancies in that body, so that each county and the city of Baltimore, may have a senator to be elected immediately by the people, reported, that the committee had had the same under consideration, and were of opinion that it ought not to pass; the bill was then read a second time.

The bill to divorce David H. White, and Ann White of the city of Baltimore, was read a second and third time by special order, passed and returned to the house of delegates.
