On motion, ordered that the several communications from members of congress, in answer to the resolution relative to the election of president and vice president of the United States be

entered on the journals of the senate.

On motion, Mr. Brownley was excused from serving on the committee to whom was referred the bill authorising the governor and council of this state, to appoint inspectors of salted fish, for the city of Baltimore, and Mr. Kent was substituted in his place.

Mr. Miller from the committee, to whom the said bill was referred, reported unfavorably upon the same; the bill was then

rejected and returned to the house of delegates.

The bill to regulate the guaging of casks, and the inspection of domestic distilled liquors in the the city of Baltimore, was read a third time, and the question was put, "shall the bill pass?"

house of delegates.

The clerk of the house delivered a bill entitled an act, relating to collectors of the public revenue which was read the first time and referred to Messrs. Bowie, Johnson, Thomas, Kent and Emory.

Also a bill entitled an act, to regulate the entering or recording of the satisfaction of any decree or judgment, entered or recorded in any court of this state, which was read the first time.

On motion the question was put, "will the senate strike out

the first section of the bill?" determined in thenegative.

On motion the question was put, will the senate receive the the following as an amendment, after the word state, in the 3d line 2d section insert the words, "and satisfaction for the same," determined in the affirmative. The bill was then read a second, and third time by special order rejected and returned to the house of delegates.

The bill to pay the civil list, and other expenses of civil government was read, passed and returned the house of delegates.

The resolution in favor of William Caton, was read a second and by special order a third time, rejected, and returned to the house of delegates.
