

shall be summoned to appear on the same days as were prescribed by any of the rules of the said courts respectively, or of any act or acts of assembly, as the case may be, which were in force, at the passage of the act of assembly, which is hereby repealed."—3d. Strike out the title and insert, "an act to repeal an act of assembly entitled, an act requiring the judges of the fourth judicial district of this state, to set apart certain days for the transaction of chancery business in said courts,—which amendments, were read, and with the bill, laid on the table.

The bill to repeal an act entitled, an act to exempt the servants of overseers of the county roads in Dorchester county, from doing duty on said roads, passed at December session, one thousand eight hundred and twenty three, and for other purposes, was read a second time, and laid on the table.

The further supplement to an act entitled, an act for the better regulation of apprentices, was read a third time, passed and sent to the house of delegates.

The bill to close up the part of an old road and make public, in lieu thereof, the new road therein mentioned, was read a second time, and laid on the table.

The clerk of the house of delegates, delivered a bill, entitled, an act relative to the public roads in Prince Georges county, which was read the first time, and referred to messrs. Herbert, Thomas and Forrest.

And returned the bill to revive and extend the provisions of an act entitled, an act to provide for the appointment of commissioners for the regulation and improvement of Snow Hill, in Worcester county, and for other purposes, ordered, "will pass."

On motion, the resolution relative, to the claim of Maryland, to a fair and equitable portion of the public lands of the United States, and for purposes of general instruction and education, was laid on the table.

Mr. Heath from the committee, reported a bill entitled, a further supplement to the act entitled, an act for making certain roads in Baltimore and Harford counties, passed at December session, 1815, chapter 48, which was read the first time, and laid on the table.

The resolution relative to postage, &c. was read a second time, and laid on the table.

Mr. Johnson presented the memorial of Samuel R. Smith, of the city of Baltimore, praying to be indemnified for losses incurred by him in consequence of the law of 1823, establishing state tobacco warehouses, which was read and referred to the house of delegates.

On motion, by Mr. Johnson, leave was given to bring in a bill to be entitled, an act to authorise a survey of the state and the making of a map thereof, ordered, that Messrs. Johnson, Sewell and Herbert, be a committee to prepare and report the same.
