Friday, January 11th, 1827.

The Senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill entitled, the supplement to an act entitled "an act for the re-valuation of real and personal property, in Alleghany county," passed at December session, 1824, was read the second time and ordered to lie on the table.

The bill entitled, an act to divorce Catharine Will and her husband George Will, of Frederick county, was read the third time—The question was put, "shall this bill pass?" Decided in the negative. The bill was then returned to the house of delegates.

The bill entitled, an act to repeal an act relating to the public roads in Talbot county, passed at December session 1825, was read the second time and ordered to lie on the table.
