inland bills of exchange, and promissory notes, and the same being read a second time, was concurred in. The bill was then read a second and by special order a third time, rejected, and returned to the house of delegates.

The act supplemental to an act, passed at December ses-

sion, 1825, chapter 199, was read a second time.

On motion, the bill authorising the governor and council of this state to appoint inspectors of salted fish for the city of Baltimore, and for other purposes, was referred to messrs. Heath, Sewell, and Thomas.

On motion, the bill for the relief of Elizabeth Saturfield, of

Caroline county, was ordered to lie on the table.

The senate resumed the consideration of the supplement to the act entitled, an act against excessive usury, and after some discussion, on motion, the question was put, "will the senate recommit the bill? Determined in the negative.

The question was then put "shall the bill pass?"—The year

The bill authorising Isaac Sweet, a free man of colour to bring his wife Caty Sweet, into this state, was read a second time.

The bill to repeal all such parts, of the constitution and form of government, as relates to the division of Frederick county, into eleven election districts, was read a second time.
