

Mr. Sewell, from the committee on divorces, made an unfavourable report upon the bill to divorce Hannah Boudet, and her husband John Peter Boudet, of the city of Baltimore. The bill was then read a second, and by special order a third time, rejected, and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Sewell, from the committee on divorces, reported unfavourably upon the bill to divorce Rebecca Thrush, and her husband Nicholas Thrush, of the city of Baltimore.—The bill was then read a second time.

The senate proceeded to the consideration of the bill to establish magistrates courts in the several counties of this state, for the trial of assaults, and assaults and batteries, and on motion, the further consideration of the said bill was postponed until Monday next, the 29th inst.—On motion, the said bill was then made the order of the day for Monday next.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a bill for the relief of Michael De Young, of the city of Baltimore, which was read the first time, and referred to the committee on divorces.

Also, a bill entitled, an act for the relief of Sophia Porter, of Baltimore county, which was read the first time, and referred to the committee on divorces.

Also, a bill entitled, an act establishing a Library for the use of the legislature, which was read the first time.

Also, a bill entitled, an act to ascertain and settle the salaries of the members of the council for the present year, which was read the first, and by special order the second and third time, passed and returned to the house of delegates,

And returned the bill, relating the removal of causes for trial to the third judicial district, endorsed "will pass."

The bill entitled, a supplement to the act, to aid conveyances of land improperly enrolled, and for other purposes, having been engrossed, was read a third time, passed, and sent to the house of Delegates.

The senate adjourned until Monday morning 10 o'clock.
