David Schnebley and John Van Lear, Junior, for the Hagerstown Bank, and Adam Whann for the Elkton Bank, were duly elected directors on the part of the state, in the several banks, for and during the time prescribed by law.

Mr. Johnson offered the following message, which was read, assented to, and sent to the house of delegates.

By the Senate, January 31st, 1827.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

The election for bank directors, on yesterday having terminated in the choice of only one director in the Commercial and Farmers Bank, we propose to go into an election for the other director in that bank immediately.

Messrs. William Crawford, Jr. and George Riston, are put in nomination by the senate. Messrs. Johnson and Sewell, have been appointed a committee by the senate, to act in conjunction with such gentlemen as may be appointed by your house, to count the ballots and report the result.
