

Messrs. Heath, Johnson, and Dennis, be a committee, to prepare and report the same.

Mr. Heath asked and obtained leave to bring in a bill to be entitled, an act regulating writs of error and granting appeals.—Ordered, that Messrs. Heath, Harrison, and Johnson, be a committee to prepare and report the same.

The bill to divorce William Scott, and Anne Maria Scott, of the city of Baltimore, was read a third time, passed, and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Harrison, from the committee to whom was referred, the bill regulating fences in Charles, Queen Ann's, and Alleghany counties, reported the same, with the following amendments, viz:

- 1st, Strike out "Queen Ann's" in the title of the bill.
- 2d, Before the word "Charles" in the third line of the 1st section, insert the word "in."
- 3d, Strike out "Queen Ann's" in the same line.

Which amendments were read and assented to.—The bill was then read the second, and by special order the third time, and passed.

The senate adjourned until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.

Saturday, February 10th, 1827.

The senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill regulating fences in Charles, Queen Ann's, and Alleghany counties, was returned to the house of delegates.

The bill entitled, an act to confirm an act entitled, an act to amend the constitution and form of government as it relates to the division of Somerset county, into election districts, was read a third time, passed, and returned to the house of delegates.

On motion, the bill to authorise the governor and council of Maryland to appoint inspectors of salted pork and beef in this state, was referred to Messrs. Johnson, Heath and Kennedy.

Mr. Dennis, from the committee to whom was referred, the report of the committee of grievances, and courts of justice, relative to a work proposed to be published by John V. L. M'Mahon, Esquire, to be entitled, "an historical view of the government of Maryland in all its branches, legislative, executive and judicial, from the æra of the grant of the charter, and the colonization of the state," with a resolution annexed, reported, that they have had the same under consideration, and were of opinion that it ought to be assented to.

The resolution was then read a second, and by special order a third time, assented to, and returned to the house of delegates..
