business claiming the attention of the General Assembly of Maryland, can all be dispatched within a much shorter time than has of late years been consumed in the sessions of the Legislature, and, whereas, it is certain that a great saving to the Treasury would arise from shortening the period of the present session, and it is most desirable that such saving should be realized, therefore"
