

The resolution proposing the appointment of a joint committee of both houses to wait on the executive and request a report of the progress made by the gentlemen appointed to revise, digest and collate the public acts of the General Assembly of this State, with the message yesterday adopted by the Senate in relation thereto, and the bill to provide for the payment of Jurors in Dorchester County, were sent to the house of delegates.

Mr. Spence from the committee made a favorable report upon the bill to fix the compensation of Jurors in Dorchester County.

The bill was then read a third time, passed, and returned to the house of Delegates.

Mr. Kennedy presented the petition of Isaac S. White of Washington County, praying for an act authorising the recording of a deed from Daniel Schnebly, late Sheriff of Washington County, to Emanuel Newcomer which was read, and referred to the committee on Invalid Deeds.

The President laid before the senate a communication an memorial from the General Canal Committee, of Washington County, praying for the enactment of a law therein mentioned, which was read and referred to the committee on internal improvement.

The Senate then adjourned until Monday one o'clock.

Monday, 14th January, 1828.

The senate met. Present the same members as on Saturday, except Messrs. Marriott, (Prest.) Kennedy, Nelson, Rees and Thomas.

On motion by Mr. Sewell, the Senate proceeded to the election of a President pro tem. Mr. Herbert was put in nomination, and the ballots having been deposited in the ballot box — on examination thereof by the clerk, it appeared that nine votes had been taken, of which, Mr. Herbert received eight, and Mr. Harrison one. Whereupon it was declared in the Senate Chamber, that Mr. Herbert, having received a majority of all the votes taken, was duly elected President, pro tem. and he accordingly took the chair.

The proceedings of Saturday were read.

On motion by Mr. Forrest, leave was granted to bring in a bill, to be entitled, an additional supplement to "an act, concerning Crimes and Punishments," passed at December session, 1809, which leave was referred to Messrs. Forrest, Lloyd and Sewell.

On motion by Mr. Spence, the bill, entitled, "An act to fix the compensation of Judges and Clerks of Elections in, and
