

commissioners of Charles-town, in Cecil county, Maryland to purchase a lot of ground for the purposes therein mentioned, reported the same with the following amendment to wit:

Add the following as an additional section: 3d. "And be it enacted, that it shall be the duty of the said trustees at all times when they are not themselves using the same, for the purposes of religious worship, upon application to open their said meeting house or church for the purpose of admitting any regularly ordained minister of the gospel of any christian denomination, to hold a meeting for the purpose of religious worship, but for no other purpose whatsoever, without the approbation of the said trustees."

Which amendment was read and rejected. The said bill was then read a second and by special order a third time. and on motion of Mr. Johnson, recommitted.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a bill entitled, an act for the re-valuation of the real and personal property in Calvert county, which was read the first time.

Also, a bill entitled, an act to incorporate a company for the establishment of a literary, scientific and military academy in Baltimore county, which was read the first time.

Also, a bill entitled, an act to authorise and empower Frisby Henderson, James Sewell and Enoch Cloud, of Cecil county, to sell and convey the property therein mentioned, which was read and referred to the committee on invalid deeds; and returned the resolution in favor of Richard Nagle of Cambria county, Pennsylvania, heretofore rejected by the senate, with the following message:

By the House of Delegates, February 12, 1828.
Gentlemen of the Senate,

We return to your honorable body, the resolution in favor of Richard Nagle, an old revolutionary soldier, and respectfully solicit your re-examination of the evidence accompanying it, when we fondly hope you will pass the same.
