Saturday, February 23, 1828.

The Senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill entitled, an act relative to the inspection of tobacco, was progressing in its third reading, when Mr. Kennedy offered the following as an amendment, to wit: In the 5th line of the 4th section, strike out the word 'felony,' which was read and dissented from.

On motion of Mr. Kennedy, the question was put, shall the bill lie on the table? Determined in the negative.

On motion of Mr. Thomas, the same question was again put, and determined in the affirmative.

The bill entitled, an act to continue in force, an act passed at December session 1823, chapter 185, entitled, an act to repair the high-ways and bridges in certain parts of the city of Baltimore, and for other purposes; and the bill entitled, an act to incorporate the Westminster savings institution were returned to the house of delegates.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered the following report and resolution, to wit: A report of the committee on claims, on the memorial of D. H. Bingham of Frederick Town in Frederick county, with a resolution for the reimbursment of expenses incurred by him in repairing the barracks at or near said town; which was read and referred to the committee on ways and means.

Also, a resolution in favor of the administrator and the securities of Francis Gillespie, late sheriff of Cecil county, which was read and referred to the committee on ways and means.

Also, a bill entitled, an act for the relief of Gabriel Isaacs an insolvent debtor of the city of Baltimore; which was read and referred to the committee on insolvent bills.

Mr. Kennedy asked and obtained leave to bring in a bill to be entitled, an act for the relief of Eli Rensch of Wash-
