Ordered, That when the senate adjourns, they will adjourn to meet at 9 o'clock A. M. to-morrow.

The senate then adjourned until to-morrow morning nine o'clock.

SATURDAY, January 8th, 1831.

The senate met. Present the same members as on yester-day. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

On motion of Mr. Herbert the senate then adjourned until Monday next 1 o'clock, P. M.

MONDAY, January 10, 1831.

There appeared in the senate Messrs. Forrest, Harrison, Kennedy, Spence and Thomas, who adjourned until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.

TUESDAY, January 11, 1831...

The same members appeared as on yesterday. Messrs. Marriott, President, Rees. Smith and Whiteley, appeared in the senate. The proceedings of Saturday and Monday were read.

The president laid before the senate letters from George Howard and Thomas C. Worthington, Esquires, accepting of their appointment as members of the executive council; which were read and referred to the consideration of the house of delegates.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a bill, entitled, An act for the benefit of William Workman, of Allegany county; which was read the first time and referred to Messrs. Kennedy, Thomas and Harrison.

Also a bill, entitled, An act relative to a part of the West-minster and Hagers-town turnpike road; which was read the first time and referred to Messrs. Forrest, Kennedy and Smith.

Also a bill, entitled, An act authorising Dr. William J. M'Elliney, of Harford county, to remove certain negroes from the state of Virginia into this state; which was read the first time and referred to Messrs. Sewell, Rees and Whiteley.

A resolution directing the treasurer of the western shore to invest the money due Montgomery county on account of the free school fund in the Commercial and Farmers Bank of Baltimore; which was read the first time and referred to Messes. Forrest, Spence and Smith.
