On motion of Mr. Harrison, the president added Mr. Forrest to the committee on invalid deeds.

On motion of Mr. Kennedy, the senate proceeded to a third reading, by special order, of the bill, entitled, An act for the benefit of William Workman, of Allegany county.

Mr. Kennedy moved to strike out the preamble to the bill, which is in these words: "Whereas William Workman, of Allegany county, kath set forth by his petition to this general assembly, that in the year 1827, he caught seven young wolves in said county, and that he obtained certificates from a justice of the peace for the heads thereof, and the levy court of said county having doubts as to their authority in levying money on the county for the same; therefore," and the question was put, and determined in the negative.

Mr. Kennedy then moved to strike out after the word "county," in the 5th line, to the end of the bill, which is in these words, "for the use of William Workman of said county, for each and every certificate he has obtained as aforesaid, such sum as has heretofore been paid for young wolves heads in said county," for the purpose of inserting the following in lieu thereof, viz. "such sum as in their discretion they may think right and proper, not exceeding the amount prescribed by law, for his having killed seven young wolves in the year 1827, on his producing to the said commissioners the certificates required by law." And the question was put, and determined in the negative.

On motion of Mr. Kennedy, the said bill was then ordered to lie on the table.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a resolution directing the governor and council to appoint two planters from each of the six most extensive tobacco growing counties in the state, and two shippers of tobacco, to examine into the condition of the public tobacco warehouses, and the different scites on the basin; which was read the first time and referred to Messrs. Thomas, Herber! and Harrison.

And the following message; which was read.
