## THURSDAY, January 20th, 1831.

The senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. Mr. Heath, appeared in the senate.

The communication received yesterday from the treasurer of the western shore enclosing a transcript of the annual report of the managers of the Washington monument, was sent to the house of delegates.

The bill, entitled, An act to authorise the recording of the will of Christian Wyandt, late of Washington county, being entitled to a third reading, was on motion of Mr. Heath ordered to lie on the table.

The senate proceeded to the second reading of the bill, entitled, An act relating to the clerk of the council.

Mr. Spencer moved to amend the 2nd section by inserting after the word "caths" in the 5th line, the following words: "and subscribe the same declaration;" which amendment was read and assented to.

The bill having been read throughout and amended, after some discussion the question was put, shall the bill as amended be engrossed for a unird reading? The yeas and nays being asked for, were taken, and appeared as follows:
