the town of Havre-de-Grace, in Harford county, to build a wharf in the river Susquehanna at the termination of St. Clair-street, otherwise known by the name of Brown's Point, in said town, reported the same with the following amendment, viz.

Amendment proposed,

At the end of the word "point," in the 6th line of the 1st section, strike out the following words: "or at any other scite which the said commissioners may deem it expedient to purchase for that purpose."

Which amendment was read and assented to.

The said bill was then read a second, and by special order a third time, and passed with the proposed amendment.

On motion by Mr. Heath, the bill, entitled, An act to provide for the consolidation and distribution of the several school funds, was taken up for consideration, read the third time, and the question put, Shall the bill pass?

Mr. Heath then offered the following message; which was read:

By the Senate, February 5, 1831.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

The senate has rejected, and now returns the bill, entitled, An act to provide for the consolidation and distribution of the several school funds. As the bill appropriates and distributes funds in the treasury, the senate has no constitutional power to amend it; and as its provisions present insuperable objections to the passage of the bill in its present form, the senate is constrained to reject it, although approving highly of the general object.
