December session 1825, ch. 162, s. 26, the state has expressly declared and pledged herself, that all the funds hereafter to be assigned and appropriated for the support and maintenance of public instruction, as relating to primary schools, shall be apportioned and distributed among the several counties of this state, and to the city of Baltimore, according to the ratio of white population, as ascertained by the last preceding census of the United States. And this enactment the senate feels unwilling to disturb.

Mr. Forrest moved that the said message, together with the bill to which it relates, be laid on the table? And the question was put and determined in the negative.

The message having been read a second time, and after some discussion thereon,

The question was put, Will the senate assent to the message?
