An act to incorporate the Baltimore Life Insurance Company; which was read the first time.

The senate adjourned until Monday morning 10 o'clock.

MONDAY, Feb. 7, 1831.

The senate met. Present the same members as on Saturday.

The proceedings of Saturday were read.

The bill, entitled, An act to incorporate The American Institute at Mount St. Marys; the bill, entitled, An act to authorise the commissioners of Cecil county, to build a bridge and open a road in said county; the bill, entitled, An act authorising the commissioners of the town of Havre-de-Grace, in Harford county, to build a wharf in the river Susquehanna, at the termination of St. Clair street, otherwise known by the name of Brown's Point, in said town; and the bill, entitled, An act for the relief of William Clare, late collector of the tax for Calvert county, severally passed by the senate; and the bill, entitled, An act to provide for the consolidation and distribution of the several school funds, rejected by the senate, were returned to the house of delegates.

The message adopted by the senate on Saturday, relative to the rejection of the bill to provide for the consolidation of the several school funds, was sent to the house of delegates.

Mr. Heath, from the committee on internal improvement, to whom was referred the preamble and resolutions relative to the Cumberland road, reported the same with the following amendments, viz.

Amendments proposed.

Add to the end of the first resolution the following words: "by ceding to this state any right which the United States may have in said road, in order that this state may erect gates and collect such tolls as may be sufficient to keep said road in repair thereafter."

Add to the end of the second resolution, the following words: "and to the governors of the states of Pennsylvania and Virginia, with a request that they will communicate them to the legislatures of their respective states, and ask their cooperation in furtherance of the objects set forth in the first resolution."

Which amendments were read the first time.

When on motion of Mr. Forrest, the said resolutions, with the proposed amendments, were ordered to lie on the table.
