Determined in the affirmative.

So the bill was passed.

Mr. Heath presented the petition of Richard Gittings, of Baltimore county; praying a divorce; which was read and referred to Messrs. Heath, Smith and Sewell.

Mr. Heath also presented the petition of William Patterson, and others, praying the passage of a law to limit further the powers of the mayor and city council of Baltimore on the subject of direct taxation; which was read and referred to Messrs. Heath, Smith and Harrison.

On motion of Mr. Heath, the bill, entitled, An act relating to the police of the city of Baltimore, was read the second time by special order, and ordered to be engrossed for a third reading; and having been engrossed, was then on motion of Mr. Heath, read a third time by special order, and passed.

On motion of Mr. Herbert, the bill, entitled, An act to alter and repeal the act, entitled, An act for regulating and inspecting weights and measures used in this state, passed at December session 1825, chapter 206, was read the third time and rejected.

Mr. Forrest from the committee, made a favourable report upon the bill, entitled, A supplement to the act to divorce Rebecca Wilson and James Wilson, passed at December session 1829, chapter 229.

The said bill was then read a second, and by special order a third time, and passed.

Mr. Kennedy from the committee to whom was referred the bill, entitled, An act to authorise the commissioners of Washington county to levy a sum of money for the erection of a bridge over Antietam creek, at or near M'Pherson's and Brien's furnace, on the road leading from Sharpsburgh to Harper's Ferry, reported the same with the following amendments, viz.

**Amendments proposed.**

Strike out the whole of the bill after the word "authorised" in the 3d line of the 1st section, and insert as follows: "and required, if in their opinion they shall deem the same necessary and proper, to cause to be erected over Antietam
