

A supplement to an act to enlarge the bounds of Centreville and for other purposes; which was read the first, and by special order a second time, and ordered to be engrossed for a third reading, and having been engrossed was then on motion of Mr. Harrison, read a third time by special order and passed.

Mr. Heath from the committee made a favourable report upon the resolution directing the governor to subscribe on behalf of the state for fifty copies of an edition of Harris's Entries, proposed to be published by Lucas and Deaver of the city of Baltimore.

The said resolution was then read a second, and by special order a third time, and assented to.

Mr. Sewell from the committee to whom was referred the bill, entitled, An act to confirm the sale and make valid the deed of conveyance from the trustees of the poor of Harford county of the alms-house and lands thereto belonging in said county, to the purchaser, delivered the following report; which was read the first, and by special order a second time, and concurred in.

The committee to whom was referred a bill, entitled, An act to confirm the sale and make valid the deed of conveyance from the trustees of the poor of Harford county, of the alms-house and lands thereto belonging in said county; to the purchaser.

Report, that by an act passed at November session 1809, chapter 37, the trustees of the poor for Harford county, were authorised and empowered to sell and convey, in fee simple all and every part of the land heretofore conveyed to the trustees aforesaid in their corporate capacity, together with all the appurtenances thereunto belonging. And by an act supplement to an act, entitled, An act for the relief of the poor of Montgomery and Harford counties, passed at December session 1828, chapter 75, the same powers to sell and convey the lands therein mentioned are vested as full, and to the same effect, in the trustees of the poor for Harford county as by the act of 1809. The committee therefore, are of the opinion, that the passage of the bill could give no relief, and recommend that the bill be rejected.

The said bill mentioned in the said report was then read a second, and by special order a third time, and rejected.
