The Senate received several days ago, your message proposing an adjournment on to-morrow, and delayed answering n, with a view to ascertain the situation of the business, and whether it could be disposed of by that time.—The Senate, from examination, is satisfied that the contemplated adjournment cannot take place consistently with the public interest, and therefore dissent from your proposition.
