Mr. Forrest, from the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims, made a favourable report upon the resolution in favour of Jannett Lingan. The said resolution was then read a second, and by special order a third time, and assented to.

Mr. Forrest, from the same committee made an unfavourable report upon the resolution in favour of Samuel Morton, a revolutionary soldier, also upon the resolution authorising the register of the land office for the western-shore to issue a land warrant to Benjamin Howard for fifty acres of land for revolutionary services. The said resolutions were then read a second, and by special order a third time, and dissented from.

On motion of Mr. Thomas, the resolution in favour of the Rev. Mr. Dorsey, chaplain of the house of delegates, and the Rev. Mr. Blanchard, chaplain of the senate, was read the third time by special order and assented to.

On motion of Mr. Thomas, the resolution relative Charles county free school fund, was read a third time by special order, and assented to.

On motion of Mr. Forrest, the senate took up for consideration the bill, entitled, An act to restrain and punish cer-

tain evil practices.

When on motion of Mr. Kennedy, the said bill, with the amendment proposed to the same, was postponed until Monday next, and made the order of the day for that day.

The senate adjourned until Monday morning 10 o'clock.

## MONDAY, February 21st, 1831.

The senate met. Present the same members as on Saturday.

The proceedings of Saturday were read.

The bill to divorce Henry Davis and Caroline M. Davis, of the city of Baltimore, passed by the senate on Saturday; the bill for the relief of John Barks, of Washington county, and Mary Barks, of Frederick county, rejected by the senate on the same day; the resolution relative to Charles county free school fund; the resolution in favour of the two chaplains; the resolution in favour of Dr. Thomas Tillotson, a surgeon in the revolutionary war; and the resolution in favour of Jannett Lingan, of Montgomery county, severally assented to by the senate on the same day; the resolution in favour of Samuel Morton, of Saint Mary's county, a revolutionary soldier; and the resolution authorising the register
