7th. At the end of the 5th section, add the following words: "the control of the state over the rail road hereby authorised to be constructed to be always commensurate with the amount of the state's interest therein."

8th. And after the 5th section as amended, add the following proviso: "Provided, That nothing herein contained shall be so construed to preclude the legislature of this state from the imposition of such taxes as may be reasonable and just, in accordance with the burthens imposed on other real and personal property."

Which amendments were read the first time and ordered

to lie on the table.

On motion of Mr. Smith, the following message was read and assented to.

Feb. 21, 1831.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

In returning to your honourable body the bill, entitled, An act to divorce Richard Gittings and Elizabeth Gittings of Baltimore county, we would most respectfully invite you to its reconsideration. The testimony in this case has been taken agreeably to law, and in our apprehension clearly proves, that at the time of the union of Mr. Gittings with the therein named Elizabeth, there was good reason to believe that her husband by a former marriage, was still living, and that there is no tribunal but that of the general assembly that can declare the separation petitioned for, null and void.
