

Which amendment was read and assented to.

The said bill was then read a second, and by special order a third time, passed with the proposed amendment, and returned to the house of delegates.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a bill, entitled, An act for the destruction of crows in Queen-Anne's county; which was read the first time and referred to Messrs. Harrison, Rees and Whiteley.

A resolution in favour of John Quynn and Andrew Slicer; which was read the first time and referred to the committee on ways and means.

Also a resolution in favour of Mary Simpson, of Allegany county; which was read the first time and referred to the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims.

Mr. Forrest asked and obtained leave to bring in a bill, to be entitled, An act relating to the court of appeals. Ordered, That Messrs. Forrest, Heath and Dennis, be a committee to prepare and report the same.

On motion of Mr. Smith, the senate took up for consideration the resolution relative to the Cumberland road; when on motion of Mr. Kennedy it was ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Sewell from the committee to which was referred the bill, entitled, An act requiring the commissioners of Harford county to open the road therein mentioned, reported the following message; which was read, assented to, and sent to the house of delegates with the bill to which it relates:

By the Senate,

February 22d, 1831.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

We have received your message with the bill, entitled, An act requiring the commissioners of Harford county to open the road therein mentioned, and requesting that the senate would re-consider and reject the amendment proposed by them. The senate are aware that the commissioners of Harford county have full power to open and shut up roads. They respectfully decline acceding to the proposal requested by the message of your honourable body.
