Mr. Smith then offered the following message; which was read, assented to, and sent to the house of delegates with the bill to which it relates:

By the Senate,

February 23, 1831.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

The senate have given to the bill relating to the lottery system the most mature reconsideration, and have found no reason for changing their opinion. They entertain the belief that the morals of the people have been infinitely benefited by the restrictions heretofore, and most carefully imposed upon the sale of foreign tickets, and they are unwilling to again open the door to all the mischiefs which would in their opinion flow from such a course. They therefore feel themselves compelled to reject the bill, and the more especially as they do not apprehend that the injury to the revenue, as suggested by your honourable body, will take place.
