

Sec. 21. And be it enacted, That it shall be the duty of the present visitors and governors of said jail to require any and all of their predecessors, to furnish and settle their accounts as visitors of said jail, and to pay over to them any balance that may be due from such predecessor or predecessors, upon their said accounts, or any of them; and to demand and receive any books, vouchers and funds, that may be in the possession, or under the control of their said predecessors, or any of them, which appertain to the business of the jail; and it shall be the duty of the present visitors, and those who may be appointed to succeed them as aforesaid, to account, and hand over all books, vouchers, property and funds, that may appertain to the business of said jail, and be in their possession to their successors, as soon as they may be ready to receive the same.

Which amendments were read and assented to.

The said bill was then read a second time and ordered to be engrossed as amended for a third reading; and having been engrossed, was then, on motion of Mr. Smith, read a third time by special order, passed, and sent to the house of delegates.

Mr. Forrest from the committee made an unfavourable report upon the bill, entitled, A further supplement to the act, entitled, *An act directing the manner of suing out attachments in this province, and limiting the extent of them.*

The said bill was then read a second, and by special order, a third time, rejected and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Kennedy from the committee to which was referred the bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, *An act to incorporate the trustees of the public school in Middle-Town, Frederick county, passed at December session 1822, chapter 170, delivered the following report; which was read.*

That at the last session a bill on this subject was passed in the house of delegates, and rejected by the senate; that at this session a petition has been presented from a number of citizens in Middle-Town in favour of a bill to contain certain provisions in regard to the school in that place, and
