On motion of Mr. Pigman, the vote given by the senate this day on the report of the committee instructed to report rules for the government of the senate at its present session, was reconsidered so far as it related to the 20th rule.

On motion of Mr. Claude the said 20th rule was then or-

dered to lie on the table.
