Therefore,

Resolved unanimously, by the General Assembly of Maryland, That in respect to the memory of the departed Governor, the members of the Legislature and their Officers, will wear crape on the hat and left arm for the residue of the session. That twenty-one minute guns be fired at sunrise, at mid-day and at sun set on Thursday next—that the state flag be displayed at half staff throughout the day, and that each of the houses will suspend its session for that day.

Second. Further resolved unanimously, that the members of the executive, and judicial departments at the seat of government, and their respective officers, be severally requested to participate in the testimonials of respect prescribed in the foregoing resolution, and that the clerks of the Senate and House of Delegates be required to communicate this request to the persons referred to.

Third. Further resolved unanimously, That his Excellency the Governor be requested to communicate these proceedings to the widow of his Excellency the late Governor Daniel Martin, and to express to her the sincere condolance of the Legislature at the heavy affliction which has befallen her by her irreparable bereavement. All which is respectfully submitted.
