

near Ellicott's lower mills, towards Georgetown, in the District of Columbia, also, passed with certain amendments by the Senate on Friday, was returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Sappington, from the committee to which was referred the bill, entitled, an act for the benefit of Joseph Fogle, of the State of Kentucky, a lunatic, reported that the committee had had said bill under consideration, and were of opinion it ought to pass, with the following amendments, which were read and assented to:

1st. In the 12th line of the first section, strike out the words "or otherwise," and insert in lieu thereof, the words "to the State of Kentucky with."

2nd. In the 13th line of the same section, after the word "Kentucky," insert the word "conditional."

3rd. In the 14th line of the same section, strike out the words "the said State of Kentucky," and insert in lieu thereof, the words "the person or persons entitled to receive the same."

The bill was then read the second, and by special order the third time, and on motion of Mr Dennis, it was with the amendments, recommitted to Messrs. Sappington, Mayer and Page.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered the following messages, which were severally read.

Gentlemen of the Senate.

We propose with your concurrence to appoint a joint committee of both branches of the legislature, to consist of five members to visit the Penitentiary, and to examine and report the state and condition of the same, and also to recommend the alteration and passage of any laws that to them may seem necessary and proper for the judicious administration of the affairs of said institution.

We have appointed Messrs Edelen, Teackle and Stewart to join such gentlemen as may be appointed on the part of your body, to constitute said committee.
