And returned the following bills which originated in the Senate, severally endorsed, "will pass."

A bill, entitled, a further supplement to an act, entitled, an act to establish a bank and incorporate a company, under the name of the Conococheague Bank in Williams Port, in Washington county, passed at December session, 1819, chapter 142.

And the bill, entitled, an act for the benefit of Mary Ann Reynolds, of Allegany county.

Mr. Pigman from the committee of Finance to which was referred the resolution in favor of Nancy and Lloyd Stallings, reported that a majority of said committee had instructed him to report favorably thereon.

It was then read the second time.

Mr. Sappington from the committee to which was referred the bill, entitled, an act to divorce Mary Eason, from her husband Jacob Eason, reported that the committee had had said bill under consideration, and were of opinion it ought not to pass.

The bill was then read the second time and on motion of Mr. Mayer, ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Sappington submitted the following message, which was read and adopted:

By the Senate,

February 24, 1832.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

We beg leave to return to your honorable body, and respectfully to submit to you for re-consideration, the bill which originated in the Senate and was rejected by your body, entitled, "an act supplementary to the act, entitled, an act to establish a House of Refuge for Juvenile Delinquents."

We are induced to make the present request, from a profound conviction of the utility of the proposed house of refuge, and of the urgent necessity of such an institution, to meet existing and imminent evils, and also from a belief that the appropriation of the fund as directed by the bill, is in accordance with the origin and first distinction of it.
