

A bill entitled, an act relative to Cypress Alley in the city of Baltimore; which was read the first time and referred to Messrs. Mayer, Wootton and Claude.

A bill entitled, an act authorising the recording of a deed from Magdalena Seibert and Jacob Seibert to Samuel Benton, of Washington county; which was read the first time and referred to the committee on invalid deeds.

And returned the bill which originated in the senate, entitled, an act supplementary to an act entitled, an act to incorporate the Warren Manufacturing Company, endorsed 'will pass.'

The senate proceeded to the consideration of the order of the day, being, the bill entitled, an act to abolish all such parts of the constitution and form of government as relate to the time and manner of electing the senate and the mode of filling up vacancies in that body, so that each county and the city of Baltimore may have a senator to be elected immediately by the people.

The bill was read the third time, and the question was put, "shall the bill pass?" the yeas and nays being asked for, were taken and appeared as follows:

And the bill returned to the house of Delegates

Mr. Claude from the committee to which was referred the memorial of Nathaniel H. Ellicott and others, counter to the petition of Allen Thomas, reported a bill entitled, a supplement to the act entitled, an act for the relief of Allen Thomas; which was read the first, and by special order the second time and ordered to be engrossed for a third reading; and having been accordingly engrossed.

On motion of Mr. Claude, it was read the third time passed and sent to the house of delegates.

The bill entitled, an act for the relief of Thomas B. Gordon of the city of Baltimore, was read the second time, and ordered to be engrossed for a third reading.
