

said inspectors giving security as required by this act in respect of the inspectors of flour.'

The bill was then read the third time, passed, and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Mayer from the committee to which was referred the bill entitled, an act for the relief of Eliza Kite, reported that the committee had had said bill under consideration, and were of opinion it ought to pass with the following amendment, which was read and assented to:

At the end of the 2d section add:

'And the said Eliza Kite shall to every effect, intent and purpose, be capable in law and equity to take and to hold and dispose of any property, and make and be bound by any contents or engagements as if she were a feme sole, and had never been married; provided however that nothing herein contained shall authorize the said Eliza to contract marriage during the life of the said Benjamin Kite, nor the said Benjamin during the life of the said Eliza'

The bill was then read the second, and by special order the third time, passed and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Claude from the committee to which was referred the leave reported a bill entitled an act to divorce Jane Freeman of the city of Annapolis; which was read the first, and by special order the second time and ordered to be engrossed for a third reading.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered the following message.

By the House of Delegates,

Gentlemen of the Senate,

We herewith return to your honorable body a resolution providing for a transfer to the free school fund, the stock and cash now to the credit of the common free school fund, and a distribution of the same amongst the several counties, and respectfully request that your honorable body will reconsider your vote of rejection and pass the resolution.
